## THE ASSOCIATION'S ACTION PLAN 2006-2007 AND ANNUAL REPORT

### Report by the Director

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- (1) That the Action Plan be approved for consultation with inter-authority groups and partner organisations; and
  - (2) That the Annual Report be published on the Association's website.

#### BACKGROUND

1. At the Annual Meeting the Association is asked to agree its main headings for action in the coming year. Members agree the work of the Association in the light of the Association's objectives bearing in mind the review of work over the past year. The Annual Report, set out in the Annex, gives a brief review of the work of the Association. The objectives of the Association are set out below.

---

#### OBJECTIVES OF THE ASSOCIATION

2. The objectives of the Association are:-
  - To provide a means for facilitating co-operation between the constituent authorities;
  - To promote the interests of local government in Hampshire and the Isle of Wight;
  - To assist member authorities in the effective performance of their duties and functions;
  - To pursue issues of common concern to member authorities and to represent their joint interests to other bodies;
  - To develop effective relationships with regional organisations; and
  - To provide a forum for exchange of ideas and experience across member authorities.
3. The Association works closely with the Local Government Association (LGA) at national level, the Regional Assembly and Government Office at regional level and other Hampshire/Isle of Wight organisations locally. The LGA's 2004 manifesto "Independence, Opportunity, Trust" called for a "bold and radical devolution of power" to Councils. The forthcoming Local Government White Paper is being developed in consultation with the LGA and the LGA's major contribution to the White Paper has just now been published. The LGA's position has the broad support of member authorities and was articulated by the Leader of the LGA at the Association's February 2006 conference on community safety.

## PROPOSED ACTION PLAN 2006-2007

4. The Action Plan for the year ahead will probably be dominated by the Local Government White Paper. The White Paper and Members' reactions to it may require a re-examination of the Action Plan. The following list is put forward based on the potential contents of the White Paper as discussed at the last meeting and following more recent discussion by Chief Executives.

### **Draft Action Plan**

#### **(1) Improvement**

- (a) Develop joint working between authorities via the Efficiency and HR Collaboration Groups (which reported to Members in November 2005). Review these groups' terms of reference in the light of the White paper and the proposed capacity-building fund for HIOW.

Leads: Will Godfrey/Dave Yates

- (b) Develop joint working on waste minimisation, re-cycling, collection and disposal based on the Strategy approved by the Association in January 2006.

Leads: Gordon Holdcroft, Peter Robertson, Brad Roynon.

- (c) Set up a HIOW consortium to make use of the capacity building fund - potentially £1m+ for HIOW area 2006-2008, see separate agenda item.

Leads: Will Godfrey/Peter Robertson/Dave Yates and others.

- (d) Review the work of all the 30+ joint officer groups across the HIOW area to engage them in the work of the Association on improvement and capacity building - including the E-Government Partnership led by Peter Robertson and Roger Tetstall now that e-Government funding has ceased.

Leads: Nick Goulder/Chief Executives' Group.

#### **(2) Performance Management**

Prepare for the impact of revised assessment regimes.

The Association arranged a briefing by the Audit Commission for Member authorities on new key lines of enquiry for performance assessment on 17 May at Fire and Rescue HQ, chaired by Roger Tetstall. We shall need to build on this to help prepare for joint area reviews and revised assessment regimes following the White Paper.

Leads: Unitary and County Chief Executives/Ian Lycett and Roger Tetstall for the District Councils.

#### **(3) Local Area Agreements/"Convenor of Public Services"**

Build on the work of Member authorities and the Association in developing Local Area Agreements (LAAs) and Local Strategic Partnerships (LSPs) to develop the role of

Member authorities as “convenors of public services” expected to be included in the Local Government White Paper. This concept has been developed further in the Lyons interim report as “local place-shaping”.

Leads: Unitary and County Chief Executives, Andrew Lloyd for the District Councils.

(4) **Community Empowerment and Localities**

Consider the White Paper proposals for new powers and governance options for localities.

Leads: Unitary and County Chief Executives/Hampshire Association of Parish and Town Councils.

(5) **Crime and Disorder**

Consider the impact of the review of Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnerships (CDRPs).

Leads: Unitary and County Chief Executives and Andrew Lloyd for the District Councils.

(6) **Local Government Finance**

Work with other South East authorities to protect Council Tax payers from loss of support grant and consider the potential impact of the White Paper and the Lyons Review.

Leads: Unitary and County Chief Executives and Chief Executives’ Group.

(7) **Growth and Infrastructure**

Assist Member authorities to plan jointly for sustainable development and ensure that the necessary infrastructure is provided.

Leads: Simon Eden/Unitary and County Chief Executives.

(8) **Children, Wellbeing, Health**

Continue to assist authorities to work together on Children, Wellbeing and Health.

Leads: Dave Yates/Simon Eden/Unitary and County Chief Executives.

(9) **Regional Relationships**

Develop the Association’s role in relation to the LGA, GOSE and the Regional Assembly following the national review of regional relationships.

Lead: Nick Goulder in conjunction with Councillor David Gillett (Havant), Chairman of the Local Government Regional Forum.

In addition, Members have asked to discuss:

- ! Disabled Facilities Grants
- ! Disability Benefits

and so we will bring forward reports on these issues.

5. We need to ensure that meetings of the Association - six are arranged for the year ahead - are useful and interesting for Members in addition to providing the necessary governance arrangements for the Association. Members' views are always welcome, and this is why Members have the five-minute slot/future agenda item on each agenda.

#### ANNUAL REPORT

6. The draft Annual Report, set out in the Annex, outlines the work of the Association over the past year. It is recommended that this Annual Report be published (as required by the Association's Constitution) on the Association's website.

**DRAFT ANNUAL REPORT 2005 - 2006**

**THE ASSOCIATION**

1. The Association represents the 15 local authorities of Hampshire and the Isle of Wight, the Police Authority and the Hampshire Fire and Rescue Authority. It provides a forum and mechanism for the local authorities in this important sub-region of the South East to work together.
2. The Association works through networks of inter-authority staff. Some 34 groups listed on our website include Planning and Transport Chief Officers, Strategic Housing, Chief Finance Officers and Chief Environmental Health Officers. New groups have been encouraged by the Association to develop policies in such areas as E-government, public health and customer service. These inter-authority groups:
  - provide policy management and support for Members
  - report to Association meetings when necessary
  - consider the impact of new legislation and other changes
  - develop contacts with regional bodies
  - help the Association look after the interests of Hampshire and the Isle of Wight.

Their work is co-ordinated by the Association through the Chief Executives' Group. The Chief Executives' Group appoints lead Chief Executives to head up work in the key areas of achievement for the Association. Details are given on our website and in Appendix 1.

3. The extensive engagement of individual Members, officers and in particular "Lead Chief Executives" has meant that the Association's direct staff resources have remained small.
4. As a result, with an expanding membership base, the Association's subscriptions from member authorities have continued to remain below their starting level when the Association was set up in 1997 following local government re-organisation. For example, District Councils paid £4,100 for membership in 2005/2006. The subscription in 1997 was £4,200.

**ACTION PLAN 2005 TO 2006**

5. The Association set its Action Plan for the year at the Annual Meeting in June 2005. The following section of this annual report considers progress in each action area:

**Management/Capacity Building**

- (1) The Association aimed to help authorities prepare for the 2007 round of Comprehensive Performance Assessment (CPA), and facilitate joint working on Local Area Agreements.

We worked to ensure that CPA inspectors are aware of joined up work across the area. A number of CPA capacity-building events were arranged on a regional basis by the Audit Commission and IDeA. In addition:

- ! New Forest District Council arranged a briefing for member authorities on the pilot for the “use of resources” assessment
- ! the Association arranged with the Audit Commission an event in May 2006 to brief authorities on developing key lines of enquiry related to access, engagement and diversity.

The Association arranged briefings for Members on local area agreements from ODPM/GOSE at two of its regular meetings, and (via the LSP capacity-building project) Local Strategic Partnerships were engaged in the LAA process. Chris Tapp (Eastleigh) and the Chief Executives’ Group negotiated District Council representation on the Hampshire LAA governance arrangements.

Lead Chief Executives: County and Unitary Authority Chief Executives plus Ian Lycett and Roger Tetstall for the District Councils.

### **Joint Working**

- (2) The Association aimed to continue to develop joint working between authorities, making best use of the Regional Centre of Excellence. This was achieved through the Joint Efficiency Group led by Will Godfrey (East Hampshire), attended by Andrew Larnar, Director of the Regional Centre of Excellence with input from Marianne Abley of the IDeA. Joint work in improving human resource (HR) management was led by a separate HR group chaired by Dave Yates (New Forest). Both these joint officer groups reported to Members who fully endorsed their work, at the Association meeting in November 2005. Their reports are on our website. They are working now to make use of the new capacity-building grant arrangements.

### **Capacity Building**

- (3) The Association aimed to complete the Local Strategic Partnership (LSP) capacity building pilot and develop the Scrutiny capacity-building work with local authorities in Thames Valley and South East Employers.

The LSP pilot was highly decentralised and involved each LSP taking a small part of the total funding of £60,000. This grant enabled each LSP to build capacity in its own way, supported by the Joint LSP practitioners and a new LSP chairs’ group set up by the Association. Project management was provided by the Association’s Director. Havant Borough Council provided the banking facility to draw down the capacity-building grant. Cllr David Kirk and then Cllr Roy Perry chaired the joint member/officer steering group. Details are shown on our website.

The scrutiny capacity-building grant of £94,000 is managed by South East Employers on behalf of both HIOW and Thames Valley. The idea for the bid started with Havant Borough Council. Winchester City Council provided the Chair for the joint member/officer steering group – Cllr Fred Allgood. The project is currently being completed and full details will be reported to the Association meeting in September.

Experience with these two capacity-building projects plus a Leadership project run by Portsmouth City Council has left the Association well placed to create a consortium for the next stage of capacity-building grant, considered at the Annual Meeting in 2006. (Update following 2 June).

### **Community Safety**

- (4) The Association aimed to develop authorities' joint working on community safety through the Chief Officers' Group with the Local Criminal Justice Board. We also aimed to assist the Hampshire Strategic Partnership to develop its role in relation to Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnerships. The joint Community Safety Officers' Group took the lead with this work and suggested a simplification of structures that leaves the lead for this work with the Local Area Agreements (LAAs). The Association arranged the final meeting of the Chief Officers' Group (COG) in October 2005 and a major conference for COG participants, LSPs, CDRPs and LCJB partners on 21 February 2006.

COG had been formed to bring together the chief officers of the criminal justice agencies, education and social services authorities in Hampshire and Isle of Wight together with representative chief executives from District Councils and the voluntary sector. The COG structure was hailed as best practice by the Home Office. The Government then set up local criminal justice boards to bring together the chief officers of the criminal justice agencies separately, and required local education and social services authorities to re-organise. With the advent of LAAs, COG agreed to disband and leave the co-ordination work with the "Safer and Stronger Communities" strand of the LAAs. The Hampshire LAA "safer and stronger communities" group includes Portsmouth and Southampton representation to try and achieve this across boundaries.

The Association arranged a review of the new licensing regime which came into effect for clubs and licensed premises in November 2005. This took place as part of the 21 February conference and is being followed up with the LGA at national level.

### **Children Act**

- (5) Members asked the Association to continue to help authorities prepare for joint aspects of implementation of the Children Act. This has been particularly important in the two-tier area of Hampshire where the Children and Young Peoples plan closely involves the District Councils. However the role of the Association has in practice been minimal as the County Council has gone out of its way to ensure full consultation. So successful has been the level of engagement between County and District Councils that we have asked the County Council to use the experience to guide other joint arrangements e.g. in relation to highways management.

## **Health**

- (6) The Association aimed to continue to work through the HIOW Public Health Network (representing the various parts of the NHS, Government Office and local authorities) to implement the public health white paper. We also worked with the Association of Primary Care Trusts and the Strategic Health Authority over the latest NHS reorganisations.

The Association arranged a series of joint meetings with the Strategic Health Authority including a Members' seminar at The Castle on 3 October 2005. We have worked closely with the Hampshire Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee in running these events. These liaison meetings resulted in re-organisation of PCTs and the Strategic Health Authority. They also enabled staff in NHS and local government to develop their capacity in relation to commissioning, public health management and other joint issues.

We also called together all public health specialists in local authorities to try and improve our joint working in this area. This work will continue forward into 2007 as resources allow.

## **Planning, Accessibility, Housing and Environment**

- (7) The Association aimed to work with the Regional Assembly, Hampshire Economic Partnership and the Island Partnership to facilitate managed, sustainable economic growth. In practice this work was carried out at sub-regional level (North East Hampshire, Mid Hampshire/New Forest and South Hampshire) and so the Association took little part in it.

Lead Chief Executives: Simon Eden (Planning and Accessibility)/Andrew Lloyd (Hampshire Economic Partnership and Learning and Skills Council)

## **Waste/Project Integra**

- (8) We aimed to renew authorities' engagement in partnership on the waste agenda: reduction, collection, disposal, procurement, efficiency and joint working, ensuring that the next stage of the Material Resources Strategy was progressed. This was taken forward under Basingstoke and Deane's leadership at a joint event on 10 October 2005. This event led to a re-designed joint approach through Project Integra agreed by the Association in January 2006. The Project Integra partnership aims to bring back developments to the Members' meeting in September 2006.

## **E-Government/Modernisation**

- (9) We continued to work through the e-Government Partnership Board to deliver a programme of joint working, including exploring the development of common standards and information sharing protocols to enable a more integrated and efficient approach to service delivery across Hampshire.



The E-government Partnership was set up following a Members' seminar organised by this Association with Hart District Council in January 2001. The Partnership has been chaired by Peter Robertson (Hampshire County Council) and has recently published a full report on its achievements. (A brochure is available on request).

### LOCAL GOVERNMENT REGIONAL FORUM

6. Councillor David Gillett, Leader of Havant Borough Council, took the Chair of the Local Government Regional Forum from November 2005. The South East Associations of HIOW, Thames Valley and Surrey hosted the successful national meeting of the Forum in Reading, November 2005. Details are given on the LGA website, and to quote from a report to the LGA Executive 16 March 2006, the "LGRF has been re-energised following a successful residential event in Reading". The LGA is now reviewing its relationship with regional bodies and sub-regional associations such as HIOW. This will be reported to Members next year.

### OTHER ISSUES ARISING DURING THE YEAR

7. In addition to the planned work of the Association resulting from the 2005 Action Plan, Members introduced the following issues during the year:

#### **Gypsy and Traveller Sites**

The Joint Authorities' Gypsy and Traveller Panel reported to the Association in June 2005. Extensive work is being carried out across authorities on identifying sites and a further report is planned for Autumn 2006.

#### **Supporting People**

The Association provides the Member-level governance arrangements for the HIOW supporting people framework. (Dave Yates is the lead Chief Executive for Hampshire Districts). Following the Association's meeting in September 2005 we wrote to Government expressing Members' concerns at changes in the funding formula. Details are given on the website.

#### **Youth Green Paper**

The Association worked with Member authorities and partners such as the Youth Offending Scheme, Learning and Skills Council and Connexions to agree its position on the Government Green Paper "Youth Matters". Details are shown on the website.

#### **Asian Tsunami**

The Association arranged a meeting of Mayors and Chairmen of Member authorities following the Asian Tsunami crisis in December 2004. Thanks to the help of Mr Jay Sellahewa of the British High Commission in Sri Lanka, the County Council sent a mission to Hambantota in Sri Lanka. A joint authorities liaison group continues to exchange information on the reconstruction work.

## **Public Sector Reorganisation**

Members were alarmed at the extensive and unco-ordinated public sector reorganisations taking place amongst partner organisations in the public sector during the year. The Association supported representations from Surrey LGA and the Association of Councils in the Thames Valley region - our letter is on the website together with the Minister's unhelpful reply. Reorganisations of the Health Service in particular are undermining the joined-up working developed through LSPs. The Association was particularly disappointed to note that this issue was ignored in the Government's December 2005 consultation "LSPs - Shaping Their Future".

The Association supported the Police Authority's campaign to retain a stand-alone police force. The Chief Constable attended the November 2005 meeting to seek Members' support. This campaign succeeded and the Chairman of the Police Authority wrote to thank the Association.

## **National Parks**

The New Forest National Park Authority came into existence during the year and the Association amended its Constitution to allow National Park Authorities membership. The Chief Executive of the New Forest National Park Authority has an open invitation to attend Association meetings. We are planning a workshop with New Forest and Sussex authorities to consider the local impact of National Park status in particular for a possible South Downs National Park including Winchester and East Hampshire.

## **International Links and European Funding**

Hampshire County Council and Southampton City Council briefed Members on this subject at the January 2006 meeting so that Member authorities can make better use of the funding opportunities available. Their report is on our website.

## **Single Non Emergency Number**

The Government is supplementing the dial-999 emergency number with a non-emergency dial-101 service. The HIOW area is in the first "wave" of the national roll-out for 101. The Association facilitated the arrangements for a "memorandum of understanding" on the subject (led by Gwen Andrews). Members approved the memorandum at their meeting in March 2006. **(Latest statistics on 101 launch to be included).**

## **Citizens' Advice Bureaux**

Citizens' Advice Bureaux (CABx) provide an extremely important service and receive the bulk of their funds from local authorities. Last year's annual report described the joint funding review carried out by the Association with Citizens' Advice, the national association of CABx. Citizens' Advice South East has continued to report progress with the results of the review.

CABx are working together to improve efficiency through joint work and to increase their funding base. Apart from the central objective of sustaining CABx services long-term, this work has:

- ! helped to limit additional funding calls on Member authorities
- ! brought other benefits e.g. a "minimal" level of statistical recording.

## A VOICE FOR HAMPSHIRE AND THE ISLE OF WIGHT

9. The interests of Hampshire and the Isle of Wight differ from those of Kent or Milton Keynes with whom we share the same Government Office and Regional Assembly. The Association has formed a regular dialogue both with Government Office South East and with other regional partners.
10. Government has recognised the significance of Hampshire and the Isle of Wight as a sub-region in its drive to “modernise” and “join up” public services. GOSE has a Hampshire and Isle of Wight directorate represented on the Chief Executives’ Group. This Association is the voice for local government in the dialogue with Government and GOSE, regional and sub-regional agencies.

## APPOINTMENTS TO OUTSIDE BODIES

11. The Association has an Appointments Panel and has appointed members to those bodies shown in Appendix 2. The Panel consisted of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Association plus Councillor Sheila Campbell of Winchester City and Councillor Paul Harvey of Basingstoke and Deane Borough. The Panel with revised membership following the elections will report to the September meeting of the Association.

## ORGANISATION AND COSTS

12. The Association meets regularly at Member level and is managed in between meetings by the Director and Personal Assistant. As a staff development initiative an officer from Winchester City Council (Jacky Adams) stood in for the Director at the January meeting.
12. The Association’s papers are shown on our website ([www.hiow.gov.uk](http://www.hiow.gov.uk)). The full costs of the Association are given in a separate report on this agenda.
13. The Chairman of the Association elected for the year was Councillor Elizabeth Cartwright of East Hampshire District Council. The Vice-Chairman was Councillor Peter Moyle of Rushmoor Borough Council.

14. The Association employed one full time Director, Nick Goulder, and a part time Personal Assistant/Office Administrator/Web Editor, Diane Allen. These staff are based at Civic Offices, Eastleigh on a fully-refunded basis. Eastleigh Borough Council provides the Association's accountancy and office support services (all fully re-funded). The Borough Treasurer, Nick Tustian, is the Association's Treasurer. The Isle of Wight Council Chief Finance Officer, Paul Wilkinson, is the Association's Auditor.
